
ARBITRATION STATUTE

ARTICLE 23 USE OF ELECTRONIC MEANS. In arbitral procedures, electronic means may be used in all proceedings and, in particular, to carry out all communications, both from the court to the parties and with third parties, for the service of procedural orders, the submission of memoirs and the conduct of hearings, as well as for the storage of the files and its subsequent consultation.

• The email is the only mean of service.



 Use of other means is left open in the event of unforeseen events.









Ninth Circuit decision from 2002


The court allowed a "special method of service" by email on an individual in a foreign country, based on Fed. R. Civ. P. 4(f)(3) and the Hague

Involves fewer complications






THE HAGUE CONVENTION - ARTICLE 1

 - What's your name and address?

 - Please note my change of address.
 - Police found him at an address (= a house or flat/apartment) in West London.
 - people of no fixed address (= with no permanent home)



"Desiring to create appropriate means to ensure that judicial and extrajudicial documents to be served abroad shall be brought to the notice of the addressee in sufficient time,

Desiring to improve the organisation of mutual judicial assistance for that purpose by simplifying and expediting the procedure"
