



Implementing the e-APP in Singapore

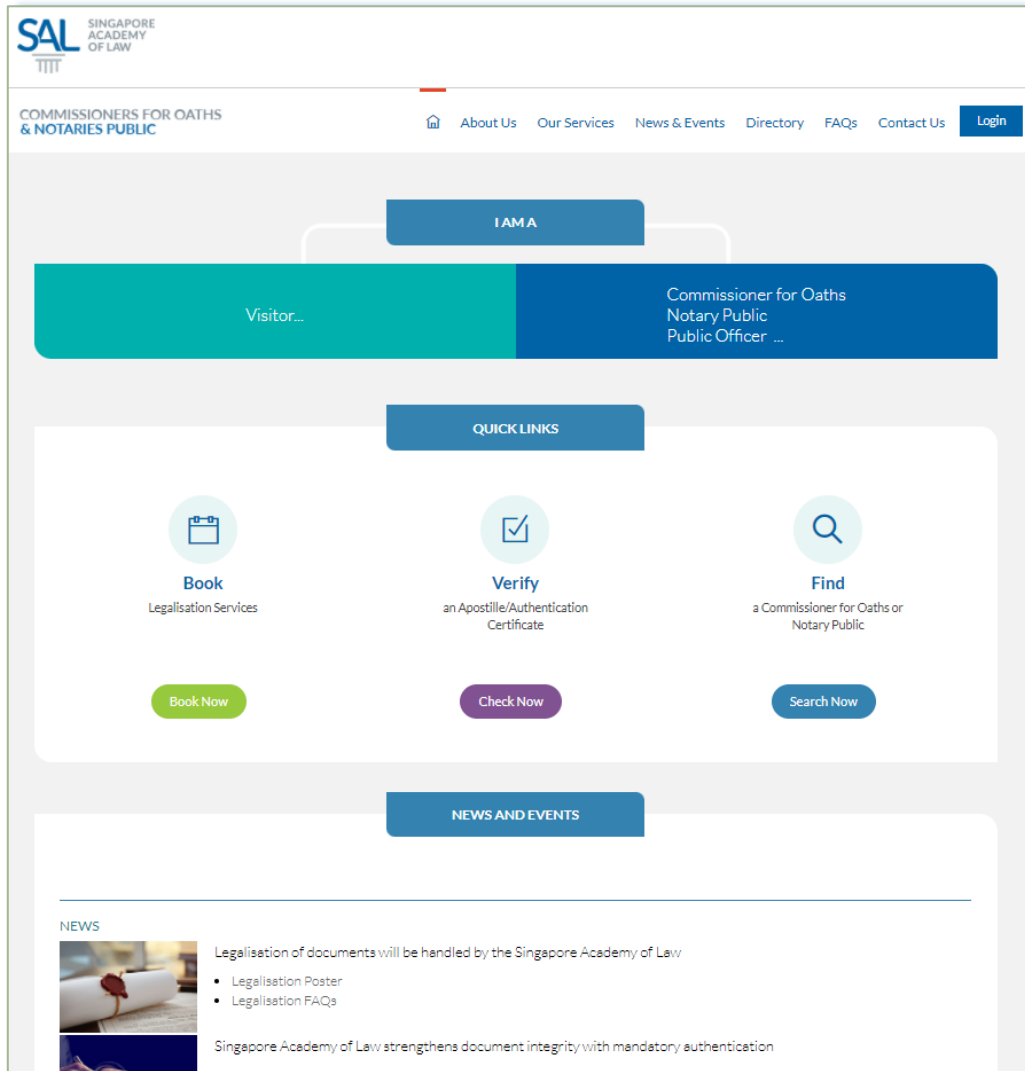
On 18 January 2021, the Republic of Singapore deposited its instrument of accession to the HCCH Convention of 5 October 1961 Abolishing the Requirement of Legalisation for Foreign Public Documents (Apostille Convention)



The Singapore Academy of Law (SAL), a statutory body headed by the Chief Justice of Singapore, is Singapore's sole appointed Competent Authority for the Apostille Convention



**Area: 734.3 sq km
Population: 6 million**



- Singapore's e-Register (<https://legalisation.sal.sg/>) was launched in 2019
- Serves as a one-stop platform for all legalisation matters in Singapore
- Provides notary search, online payment and verification functions for the public
- Features a digital workbench for notarisation by notaries and legalisation by SAL officers

THE ISSUES

Reports of fraudulent notarisation due to:

- No uniform format for notarisation
- Need for authentication of notarisation determined by receiving party
- No verification process to allow receiving party to check that a notarised document was authentic

THE RESOLUTIONS

SOLUTION

In 2016, SAL attended the 4th Apostille Special Commission and 10th e-APP Forum in the Hague to understand the experience of Contracting Parties who have implemented e-Registers

Fourth meeting of the Apostille Special Commission and 10th e-APP Forum



From 2 to 4 November 2016, over 190 experts from over 65 States and international organisations around the world participated in the fourth meeting of the Special Commission on the practical operation of the *Hague Convention on Abolishing the Requirement of Legalisation for Foreign Public Documents* (Apostille Convention). For the first time, a meeting of the Special Commission was directly preceded by an International Forum on the electronic Apostille Program (e-APP). The 10th International Forum took place on 1 November 2016.

The Apostille Convention is, to date, the most widely ratified and acceded to of the Hague Conventions, with 112 Contracting Parties. Its popularity is due in large part to its significance in the lives of citizens and facilitation of cross-border trade and commerce. As a result, the

Apostille Convention has proven to be extremely useful and is applied millions of times each year throughout the world. The e-APP continues to facilitate the effective and secure operation of the Convention and has also experienced an impressive expansion in recent years, with over 200 authorities in 29 Contracting Parties now having implemented one or both components of the e-APP.

E-Register for notarised documents:

- Mandatory authentication of all notarial certificates issued in Singapore
- Notarial certificates to be system-generated through e-Register and to bear a unique ID number
- Verification portal at www.legalisation.sal.org.sg



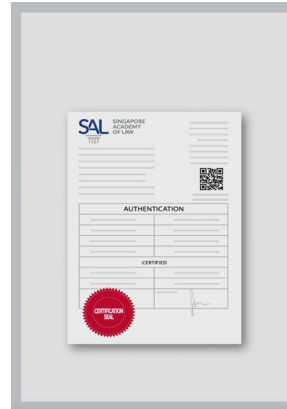
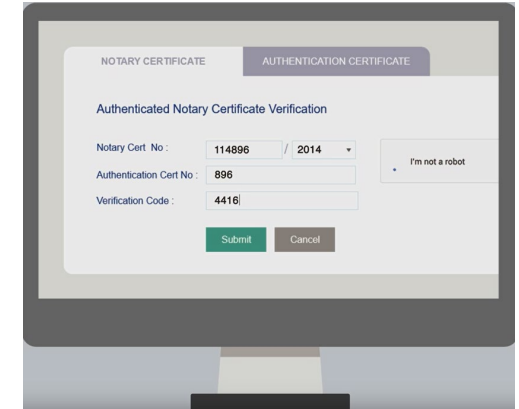

**RESULT****From 1 Oct 2019:-****NOTARISATION****AUTHENTICATION****VERIFICATION**

- All notarial certificates and authentication certificates are processed and generated through the e-Register system
- Notarial and Authentication certificates are serialised and QR-coded by the e-Register
- It is mandatory for all documents to be authenticated by SAL
- A recipient of the notarised document will be able to search and verify the authenticity of the notarised document via a search register/portal in the E-Register system

- ✓ The e-Register ensures a complete proper record of documents notarised.
- ✓ All notarial certificates will bear a unique system-generated ID number.
- ✓ The system also allows you to view past notarisation records as well as void submitted authentications

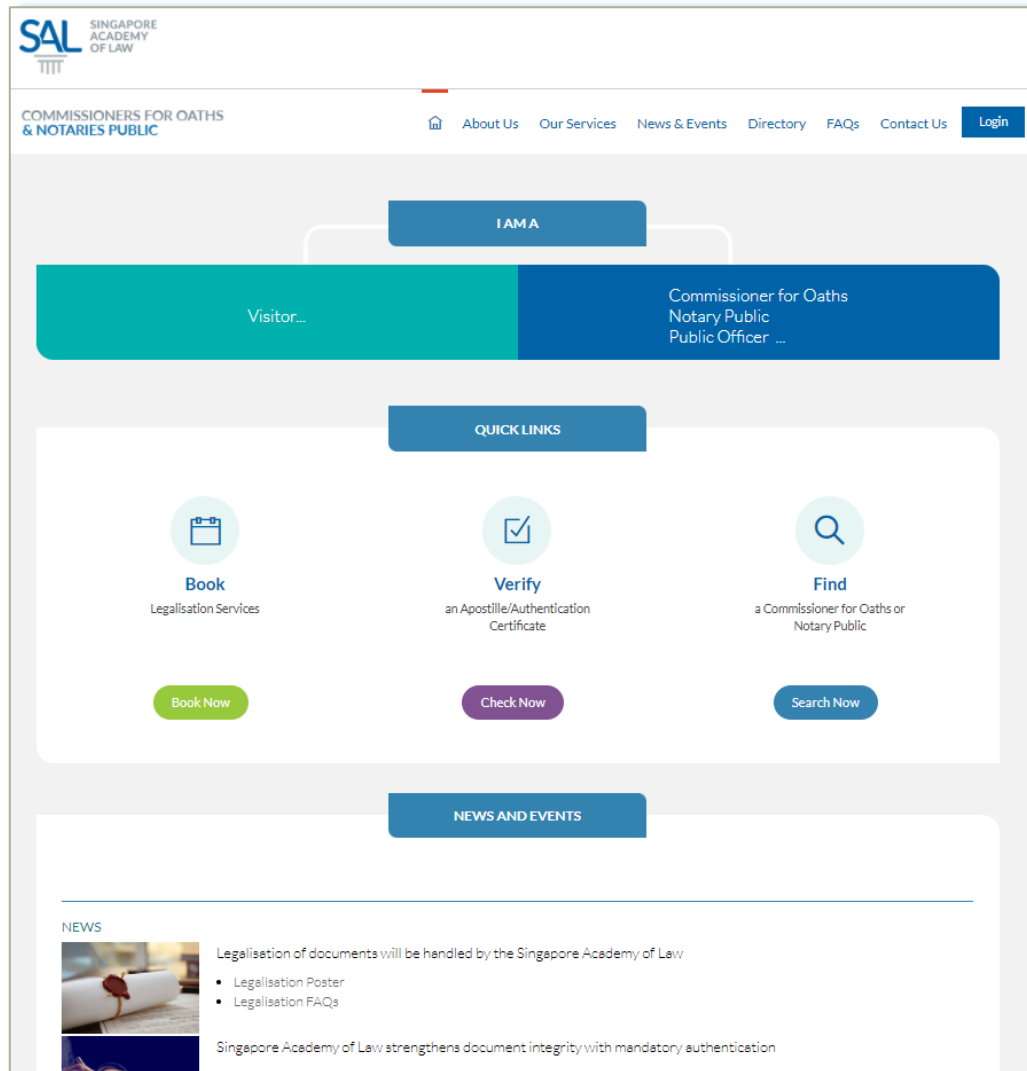
Today, 18 January 2021, the Republic of Singapore deposited its instrument of accession to the *HCCH Convention of 5 October 1961 Abolishing the Requirement of Legalisation for Foreign Public Documents* (Apostille Convention).

On behalf of the Embassy of Singapore, Minister-Counsellor Davinia Aziz deposited the instrument and is pictured with Mr Rieks Boekholt, Legal Officer, representing the depositary, the Treaties Division of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs on the Netherlands.

With the accession of Singapore, the Apostille Convention now has 120 Contracting Parties. Singapore is the third ASEAN Member State to join the Apostille Convention. It will enter into force for Singapore on 16 September 2021. More information on this Convention is available on the [Apostille Section](#) of the HCCH website.

Contracting Party to **four HCCH Conventions**.

 **Updated to cover Apostilles since 16 September 2021**



- Apostille affixed to reverse side of underlying document
- SAL issues apostilles for legalised documents bound for both contracting and non-contracting parties
- Additional text to notify that if the document is to be used in a country not party to the Hague Convention of the 5th of October 1961, it should be presented to the consular section of the mission representing that country.

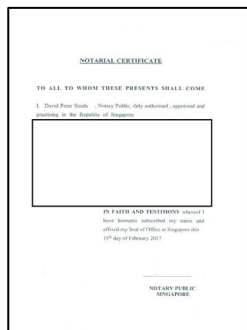

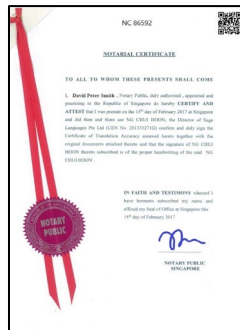

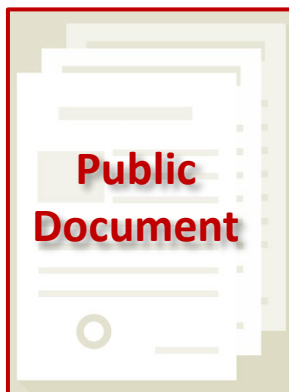
Notarial Certificate (NC)

A Notarial Certificate (NC) is generated through the e-Register

Applicant brings notarised document to SAL



- Staff scans QR code on NC, generates and affixes Apostille

Applicant makes online payment

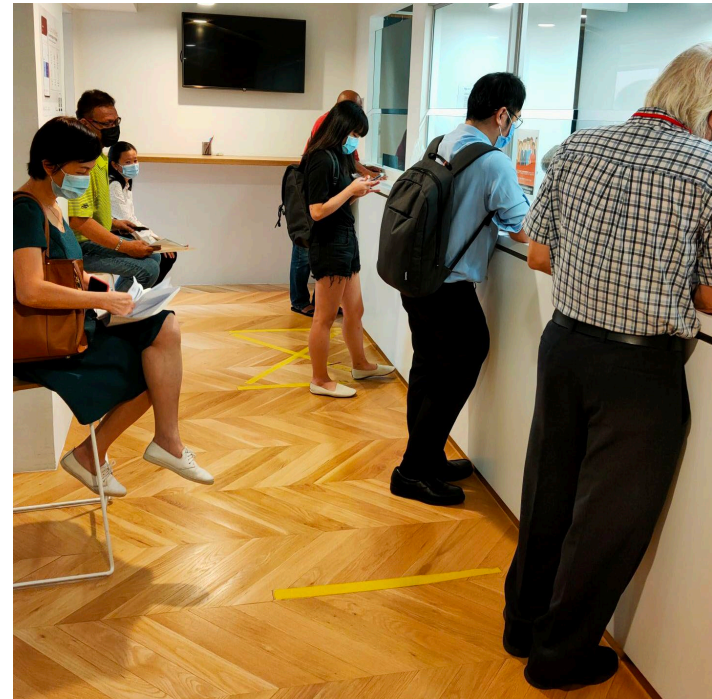
Applicant brings public document to SAL

SAL issues an average of 800 paper apostilles over the counter daily



Average turnaround time of under 1 min for issuing each Apostille



A fee of S\$10.70 is chargeable for each document legalised

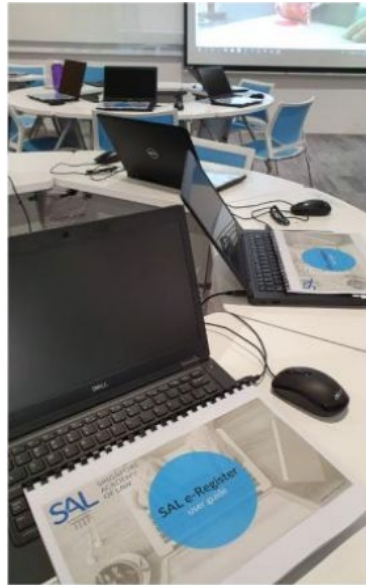

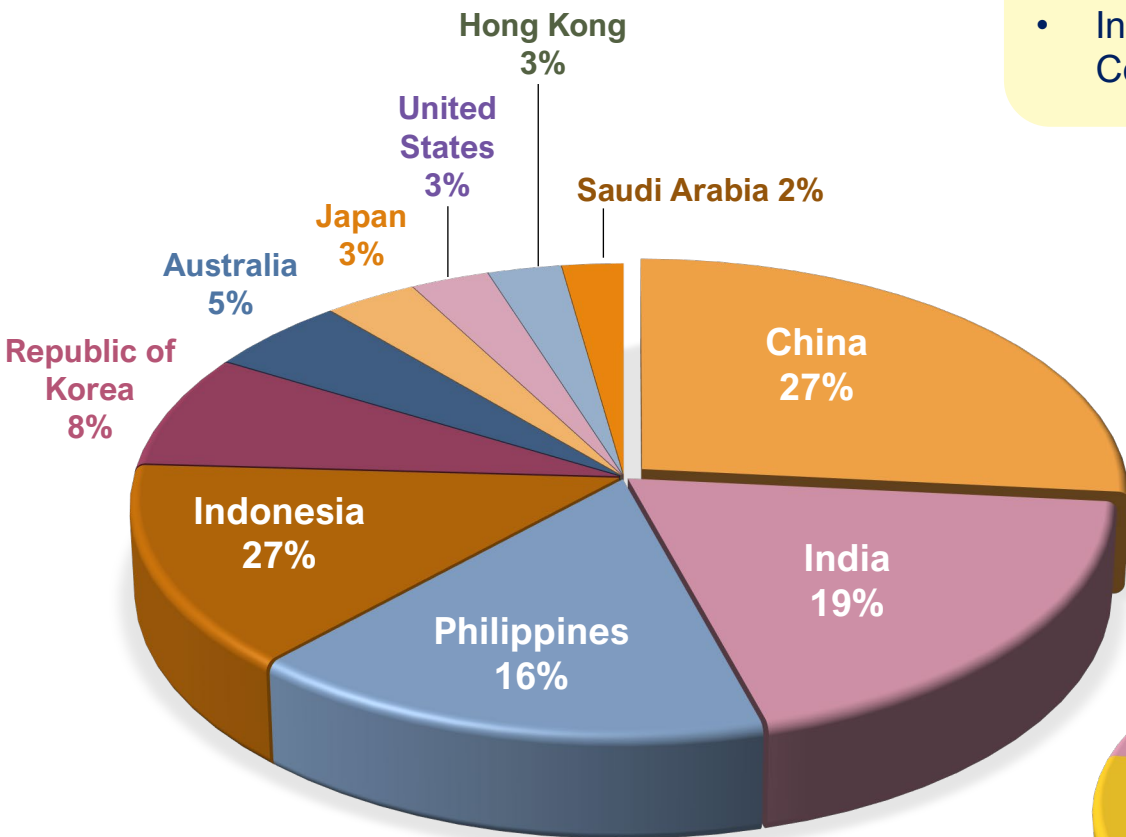


Almost 40 training sessions were conducted for over 700 notaries over 2 months before operationalisation in October 2019



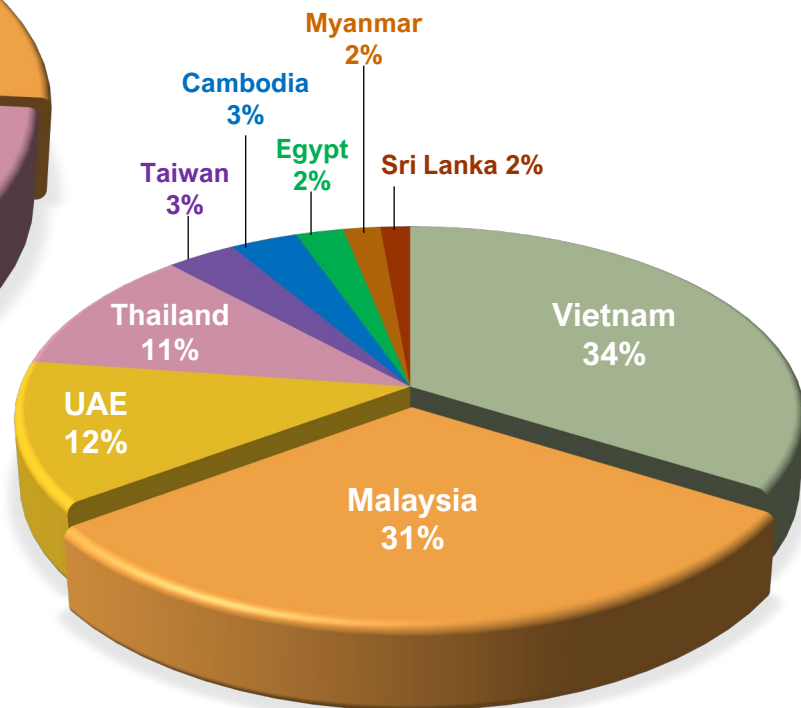


HCCH Top Destinations among Contracting Parties

* % of total apostilles processed via e-Register since the Apostille Convention came into force in Singapore

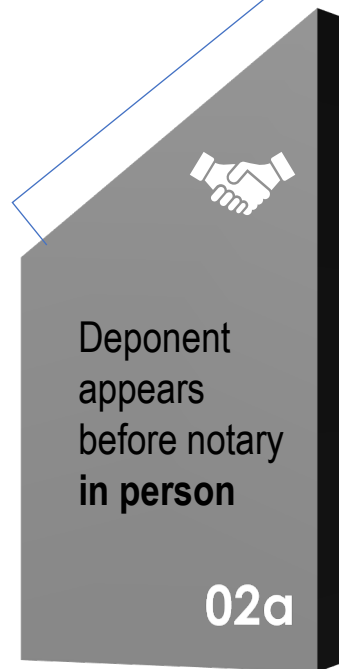
PHASE 1 LEGALISATION

Focuses on taking an electronic public document in and wrapping the e-apostille around it



PHASE 2 NOTARISATION

Extend to notarisation in phases, so that notaries can cope



1. Authenticate

2. Verify

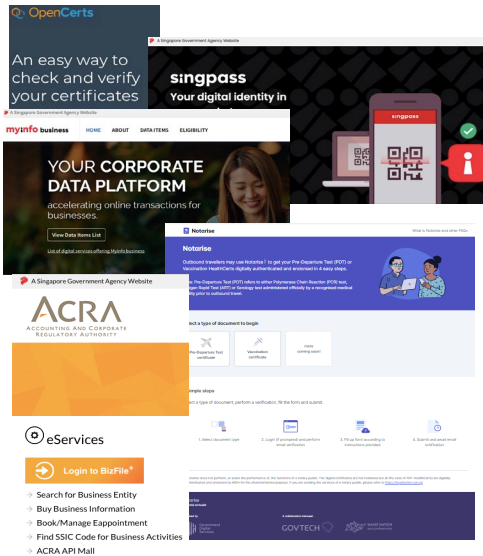


E-Register verifies public document

3. Transact



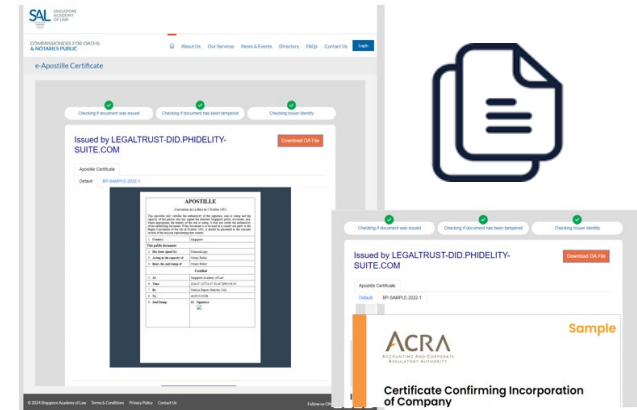
E-Apostille is issued to the electronic doc



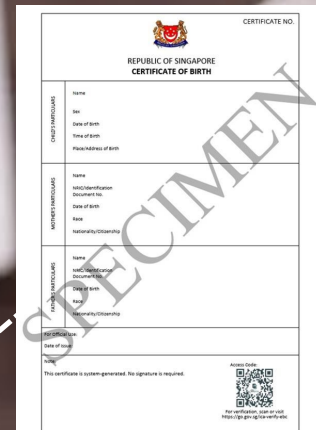
- Applicant self-authenticates via SingPass at respective Govt database to access the electronic public document



- Applicant shares access to electronic public documents with SAL
- SAL verifies electronic document



- SAL generates e-apostille to be attached to electronic public document as a single file
- This is emailed to the applicant
- Receiving party can verify at www.legalisation.sal.sg
